What Art Does for Us

In all honesty, I am a mediocre artist. So why do I continue to make mosaic pieces? For the money? HA! If money were the issue I'd earn more working at McDonalds. And why do I love to go to museums and art galleries to view other people's art? The op-ed in the New York Times by David Brooks' gave me a few answers.

I meditate (sporadically) not to reach some kind of nirvana but to quiet my skittering mind. And I have found that creating something has the same effect. Brooks puts is so much more eloquently "...a piece of art quiets the self-conscious ego voice that is normally yapping away within." I imagine that Brooks is talking about viewing art, but as only artists will be reading this, I'll include that the creation of art does the same thing. And the process of creation doesn't really necessarily limit itself to paint, canvas, fabric, or glass. Gardening forces me to be creative — not just straight rows of flowers marching side by side. How about cooking? I always seem to experiment when we have guests for supper — thank whatever gods rule the universe, I haven't poisoned anyone (yet). But I once did make an Indian dish so hot (spicy) that we had to go out to eat!. One of my more ignominious moments.

So even when using what creativity we have, gardening, cooking, arranging ones furniture; it is the act of creating something from of our chosen medium — the result changing the medium from

simply "stuff" to an entirely new cohesive object. Brooks puts it this way. "...Art works at a deeper level ... it serves as a portal to a deeper realm of the mind ... that hidden semi-conscious kingdom within us from which emotions emerge and moral sentiments are found."

Truly, artists don't have to have a reason for their creation — it springs from the need to just "do it." My medium, my subject matter, my colors, my creation. You don't have to love it when you look at it. Just open your mind and look for the creativity. I could pull my hair out when I see a pile of rocks the middle of a room and beside it is a I5 page "artist's statement." It's me, the viewer who should be forming a statement. And even if I hate the work, I should try to find creativity in it — statement or no statement. And go home and make my own pile of rocks!

If art can do anything, it can bridge the gap between rich and poor, liberal or conservative, male or female — in fact, all the things which divide us in an increasingly political and divisive world. When I'm in a museum or gallery, I am in "time out of time" — just reveling in how we humans experience our world — so many ways, so many colors, so many forms. My job is to internalize what I see and go home and create something myself!

To all of us who lose ourselves in our creations, I thank each and every one. You've made our existence just a bit better by putting a piece of yourself out into a scary world.

LIBRARY EXHIBITS
